

Keep a Child Warm has more schools and groups supporting each year. If you are one of these new coat collection points then a massive thank you to you. This small act of kindness makes a lasting impact.

This year's response for Keep a Child Warm has been overwhelming and will enable us to provide desperately needed warm coats, hats, scarves, blankets and gloves to orphans and impoverished children, particularly from war-torn Ukraine and Moldova.

The cost of running this project; picking up donated clothing from around the UK, packaging and transporting it to the various countries, is by far the most cost effective way of doing things. For as little as £8 we can provide a whole winter kit for a child in need.

As well as donations of second-hand items, we are grateful to receive brand new clothing from a number of UK companies. Huge thanks to Blue-Max Banner. Uniformality, Player Layer and Tiger Stores who have recently donated brand new items of clothing for orphans and needy children. During a visit to an orphanage in Ukraine this March I was given a guided tour. The first thing I noticed on entering the first dormitory style bedroom was the brightly coloured knitted blanket, laid neatly over the bed. "That's MY bed" one of the young girls cheerfully claimed. I thought about how delighted she was to have something so many of us take for granted, something she called her own. I thought about the privilege of being able to show kindness to these children who don't experience

much of this in their lives. I thought about Loving Hands and the many other knitting groups who send regular parcels of beautifully knitted items for us to distribute.

I love my job. I am passionate about helping these precious children and I am incredibly grateful to those of you who enable me to do this by donating your time, talents and treasure to the cause.

#### **Building Homes and Lives**

This was the moment I'd been waiting for. Since the day we heard about these children orphaned by the Ebola outbreak in Sierra Leone and made a commitment to supporting them long term, I'd been desperate to meet them in person. This trip did not disappoint. It was everything I'd hoped and I can't wait to go back next year and see how the project has developed.

After a gruelling journey by taxi, three aeroplanes, a speed boat and final drive to Heaven Homes, we were more than ready to arrive and sleep. Our trip was varied; painting & decorating, playing football, dancing, teaching at the school, playing games and of course - the grand opening of the first two homes and seeing the children move in!



The chief, counsellor and other guests came to be part of this opening ceremony which was a really special event. They gave speeches of gratitude for the financial support and aid containers Operation Orphan sent last year and reminisced about the difficult time when these orphans were first discovered.

We've come a long way since then. Thanks to people who generously give to our Keep a Child sponsorship scheme, these children now have a safe place to live, access to education, regular meals and everything else they need. Living in a house with carpet tiles, colourful paint, a lounge and a dining suite is literally a dream come true for them. These are things most of their friends live without. Seeing how they took off their shoes before walking on the concrete floor made me see they will care for what they have and that they feel privileged to have it.

We've had some wonderful opportunities to celebrate this story through radio interviews as well as local and regional news and to let people know we still need financial donations to build homes for the other thirty orphans.

Two people who have gone above and beyond to fund the building of a home are Jan and Clive Roberts. Their story is quite inspirational as they decided to use their Golden Wedding Anniversary as a way to raise money for

the Ebola orphans. Along with family members, they took on sponsored challenges – losing pounds (lbs) to gain pounds (££££). They shared the need for homes with friends and family, near and far and managed to raise a whopping £10,000 for the Heaven Homes building fund.





#### Forget-Me-Notts

For the last 4 years we have been providing a gift at Christmas and a chocolate egg at Easter for over a thousand children in (and known to) the care system across the Midlands.





The aim is simple; to let these children know that they haven't been forgotten. This Easter we had more donors, more volunteers and were able to give to more children than ever before. With donations of both Easter eggs and money from Nottingham Knights Cheerleaders, Rothera Dowson, Keepmoat and the Legal Aid Agency we were able to give eggs to all the children who received something at Christmas and to four new places in some of the most deprived neighbourhoods in the Midlands.

One of our newest contacts told us he'd given an egg to a teenage boy who said he'd not had one for over 4 years. This boy's dad had died last year and he'd had no contact from his mum since. An Easter egg might seem like a small gesture but to this lad and 1,768 other children, it has helped them to know that they do matter and they haven't been forgotten, remembering that their emotional health is vital

## Learning in Zimbabwe

Keep a Child Learning - Africa





An amazing project, based in Zimbabwe to help AIDS orphans, has seen a restructure this year. The wonderful Nev Borradaile founded the Amatelaz Homework Centre when she lived in Zimbabwe and has tangibly affected the lives of many orphaned children. Some of these little ones are now grown up and when Brad visited earlier this year, he met up with a few of them.

Senior (pictured) runs a successful tailoring business, making bespoke garments to order. He was inspired to learn to sew during his time at Amatelaz and was found to have an amazing talent. We later found out that his



late father was a tailor! Senior has found that he can use his talent to make a living for himself.

The project is now being managed by June Goss and Jacob Mashamba. Jacob who is the centre coordinator, continues to do an excellent job of supporting the students with their homework and revision for national exams. Jacob was himself orphaned as a child. This means that his role is not just a job to



him but that he empathises with these children on a personal level. Underpinning his educational support is genuine care and concern for the students' wellbeing.
