Molly Bridge holds a knitting and nattering club at her nursing home and often sends her granddaughter, Sarah, with the fruits of their labour. At the grand age of 96, Molly says she teaches the 'old folk' how to knit! Over the last 6 years just Molly alone has knitted about 50 blankets for us. She spotted a blanket she'd made being handed out

to Nepal earthquake victims when the local news featured a clip about Operation Orphan. Molly quickly made the front page of the Grantham Journal - a lovely encouragement.

Another crafter from the Shetland Islands has been teaching children at Ollaberry Primary School how to crochet and how to sew beautiful fleece hats. Julia Odie recently saved some donations from being ruined by a freak house fire, before bringing a van full of items all the way to Nottingham. Julia is a fantastic ambassador for the charity and volunteers her time raising funds and awareness throughout the Islands. We are pleased to say Julia is coming with us next year to share her crafting skills with the Ebola orphans in Sierra Leone!

counties or even national organisations getting involved. If you would like to be part of this please get in touch.










How many items of clothing can you put on in 60 seconds?

"It made a difference when we met deaf people who run businesses, work as teachers and can teach us a new language!" Imagine not being able to communicate with your child! How would life be with your teenager if all you could express was; "don't do that", "are you hungry?" or "time to sleep"? In the past, parents in Zimbabwe with deaf children had no support in learning to use sign language themselves and their children could only go to school if parents could afford fees for a school in one of the big cities, so this was often the best they could hope for. Parents and deaf children themselves were very isolated.

"I thought I was the only person in the world with a deaf child until I came to Nzeve. There I met other mothers and children with the same challenges. It has helped me to cope – knowing I can talk to other people who understand my situation. Now I have learnt how to communicate in sign language I can start to build a relationship with my child."

As well as educating the children, Nzeve organises teams of parents and staff, along with deaf adults, to bring awareness to communities in the Manicaland province. Village leaders report that their communities have become more sensitive to those with disabilities, no longer calling these people "worthless". They also recognise the special needs of families with deaf children, who may need to go to school far from home.







Good Health in Ghana

Keep a Child Healthy

For years we have been working with The King's Village in Northern Ghana to care for malnourished children. Hundreds of tiny babies each year are brought to the Nutrition Centre in desperate need of care. Frequently it is their mothers who bring them and the root of their malnutrition is a lack of education around what their babies need. Often malnourished children are viewed as being cursed, so they are thrown out of their communities, or even put to death by the local witch doctor.

It is these practises that the Nutrition Centre and its amazing staff aim to eradicate by educating mothers on how and what to feed their babies. They aim to show these communities that far from being cursed, these children can be saved. In 2015 the Nutrition Centre admitted 248 patients and were able to save 231. This is a great outcome with so many acute cases.

Terry and Ann, our project coordinators, have been travelling to Ghana for the last 8 years to oversee the success of this centre and to promote good sanitation and hygiene across the Tolon-Kumbungu District. Terry and Ann have also been working further north

of the King's Village. A run down clinic building north of the Volta River has now been refurbished. Complete with an ambulance boat to transport the more acute patients to the hospital, this centre now provides a nurse, sent from the King's Village Medical Centre. Thanks to our generous donors in the UK, Operation Orphan is also helping to fund supplies for this 'Overseas' clinic. The village chief is delighted that this is finally happening as this clinic could potentially serve a huge area, about 6,500 people.

We love getting reports back from the Nutrition Centre in Ghana. They say that a picture is worth a thousand words. So see for yourselves the

difference this amazing project is making. Meet Ammina, Rashida and Sumaila (and a Minion!!?). These triplets were barely surviving out in the village of Dalun and had to be brought into the Nutrition Centre towards the end of March. They weighed between just 2.8kg and 3kg each. Without intervention they would not have all survived, but as you can see now they are doing really well and are weighing in at 4.9kg. 4.6kg and 5.5kg.

We love these happy stories. Thank you again to everyone who supports this amazing work.



Northern Iraq



We've had some moving updates from our partners in Northern Iraq. A family of three orphans were recently taken on a shopping trip to the market to buy some of the things they desperately needed. They couldn't stop smiling as they ran around, having fun in the markets and shops.

"These children were very sad and did not know joy and hadn't smiled in a long time, but today you have brought joy to their hearts and you have made them smile again."

Iraq is a place of little hope and constant war. The hope this small act brings shows them that there is love and hope for them and it makes all the difference.



On their first trip to Iraq in November last year, Sam and Steve met a little boy who stole their hearts. He has a cognitive development disorder which has led to multiple health issues. Our partners tell us that he is now under a paediatric psychologist and has moved from the dark, damp caravan that he was in to a partner organisation building. This provides support for the whole family and a better temporary home. This has been made possible through the support of our partners and funded by people in the UK who care.
