As most of his work is spent developing our Forget-Me-Notts project, Rob is usually the man for job; delivering (and fitting) larger household items that come through our referral scheme.

Referrals keep coming in thick and fast, demonstrating the genuine needs of vulnerable families in our local area. Many of the requests we receive are for beds, floor coverings and storage. When you see little ones sleeping on cold concrete floors and using plastic bags for clothes storage, it really does confirm the huge need there is within our community. We are thrilled to be meeting many of these needs through Forget-Me-Notts.

Heaven Homes



Our truck load of aid arrived in Sierra Leone. After taking a while to clear customs, it finally made it to Heaven Homes where the contents are being used to strengthen the care structure in a number of different ways. From school resources and furniture to brand new mattresses, the items donated are being used to improve the school, the homes and the wider community. Thanks to every person who gave to this appeal.

Since our last visit Kippy has sought advice from mental health specialists within the country and is awaiting recommendations as to what help is available in Sierra Leone. Our planned expedition in April was unfortunately postponed as a duty of care to our runners, volunteers and partners. This was primarily a safety measure and to not cause unnecessary stress on our volunteers and friends at Heaven Homes during the height of the political tension. As the elections took far longer than anticipated we took the 'safety first' decision to postpone the trip until later in the year. We can't wait to get back there and visit the children.







When we were first introduced to our Congolese partners, Donald and Marie, we knew instantly they were the real deal. Having moved from their home country to the UK, this couple would often return to DR Congo for a family holiday. Little did they know one particular holiday would change their lives forever.

Marie was introduced to 30 children, orphaned by war and fending for themselves at a disused property. It was then her heart broke for these children and she decided to step in and help. For years the couple and their wider family have been working in the UK and sending money home to provide for these children. They have given their entire lives to this cause.

Now that we are working together, Donald and Marie are able to concentrate their efforts on the things that matter most, ensuring the children are well cared for and have access to all of the things they need.

The wonderful thing is that Donald and Marie have made sustainability a priority as they build Hebron Home. Firstly they've established a transportation business to create a sustainable income to supplement the donations from Operation Orphan. This means that they are not entirely reliant on overseas funding. Now they are farming the land to grow their own food supply.

Five of the children are now at university and the 25 younger children are living at their new home. They have moved to nearby schools and are settling in well. What was going to be a vacation home for the couple has now become Hebron Home, a safe home and sanctuary for children who have experienced such a traumatic childhood.

In addition to the children living in residential care, Marie and Donald are helping 137 living in the community.

How You Helped... Anna

My name is Anna and I'm 14 years old. I am originally from Mile 91 in Sierra Leone.

I have a sister and three brothers. My life was very different before I came to Heaven Homes. When I lost my father and mother I felt so sad and I was suffering. I didn't go to school, I was ten years old then. When I came to Heaven Homes I began going to school and learning. I am so happy for this opportunity and I am doing so well at school. When Operation Orphan come to visit us they make us feel so happy. They brought us a guitar so now we can sing with music. I share a room with the other girls at Heaven Homes. We are all like sisters now and we care for one another.



The Project

Anna was one of sixty children who came to Heaven Homes in November 2014. These children had been rejected and treated like outcasts. The reason? They had survived Ebola. In many African cultures the usual practice is to absorb orphans into the wider family, however either these children had lost all their family to Ebola, including their extended family, or wider family were simply too afraid to take them in due to their close proximity with the virus.

Heaven Homes was originally set up as a school supporting the local community. When the Ebola outbreak happened the school was closed and the founders decided they had to do something to support these desperate children. They turned the school into a temporary home.

Over the last three years Operation Orphan has helped to build four homes. The children are placed with an 'auntie' who takes care of them and other children of ranging ages. When teams have been to Sierra Leone to visit it's plain to see that they are well looked after. Heaven Homes has been recognised as

a flagship children's home in the country because of their excellent standard of care. We know that supporting them is not just about meeting their physical needs, but also the psychosocial. We are therefore also keen to find ways of helping the children process the trauma they have been through.
