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## Keep a Child Warm

This year's packing week felt even more like a community effort than ever before. For the seventh year running, Chilwell School Sixth Form gave us a week of their time to support our sorting and packing process. As well as some students from National Academy who joined us for a day, we were happy to have help from some of our charity ambassadors as well as some regular volunteers. This year we were simply blown away to see so many past Chilwell School students (now either working or at university) come back to help throughout the week. This speaks volumes and we are so thrilled to see these familiar faces year on year.

In 2017 we packed around a thousand coats (as well as many other warm items) for children in Moldova but this year we packed 1300 for specific children in Moldova alone. As well as the consignment for Moldova, we have also shipped containers of aid to help children in Syria, Hungary and Romania.

Before packing week, we had tonnes of help to prepare donations. 100 Year 9 students from Trent College came through our warehouse in relay during one week. 10 students each morning and a different 10 each afternoon - we got a lot done that week! Individuals and teams from local companies also came and volunteered for

a day or two. This was an overwhelming response to our call for volunteers and we are so grateful for the increased support we've seen over this past year.

The Global Expedition to Moldova is such a fantastic opportunity for us to get involved in giving these coats and warm items out to the children and seeing the gratitude on their faces makes it all so worthwhile.

#### A fully funded Critical Care Unit is up and running.

Ann & Terry mark a decade of the Nutrition Centre with an amazing donation from The Cherish Foundation, enabling the build of a vital Critical Care Unit. At the King's Village, severely malnourished babies who present with malaria, infections and dysentery first require medical intervention before their nutrition programme can be a success.

Thanks to this generous donation, work began straight away and the Critical Care Unit was up and running in no time. Now that the unit is fully functioning it's been continually full to the brim with babies requiring this kind of critical care

The staff are doing a wonderful job of continually bringing babies back from the brink of death.

We often see desperate images on TV of children who are suffering but the photos we prefer to show you are those of children whose lives have been turned around by this brilliant intervention. Photos that show, thanks to the work at the Nutrition Centre, hundreds of babies who were dying but are now healthy and well.

# How You Helped... Tasha

My name is Tasha, I am 17 years old and I am an only child. I was born with cerebral palsy and because of this, sadly my father left while I was a baby. My mother and grandparents look after me and do the best they can.

Over the years, as I have grown up and got heavier, my mum has struggled to lift me and this has caused damage to her back. Now that I'm over 16 I am unable to access any support from the government. I live in a rural village that has a beautiful view. When the Operation Orphan team come to visit, I felt so happy to see them. They care a lot about me and my mum too.



#### The Project

Through our Keep a Child Warm project we have been introduced to some fantastic social workers and local people in Moldova who care a great deal about their community. Tasha is one of the vulnerable children we have helped for the past two years. By making some essential improvements at her home we aim to make it easier for her mum to give the 24-hour care she requires, specifically reducing the negative impact on her back. This helps to ensure Tasha will be cared for longer term.

We've added an external access door to her bedroom and improved the bathroom to provide adequate washing facilities for Tasha. This year we provided a new double bed for both her mum and Tasha to share. This came with a brand new comfy mattress and it was wonderful to see their reaction when we visited in October.

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Our first chance to get 'boots on the ground' in DR Congo proved to be so worthwhile. Brad was on the first South African Airways flight into DR Congo since they stopped all air traffic months ago. Needless to say this attracted news coverage! Whilst he was there he met so many beautiful children who have endured such a tragic past. We are thankful that these kids now have a home and a safe place in our Keep a Child family.

In a country where basic survival is incredibly hard, the team at Hebron Home are setting an example of how to love, support and value the life of an orphan.

It was encouraging to see how the money donated through Operation Orphan is making a significant and efficient impact. They are also wisely generating sustainable sources of income and food from within the country.

Donald and Marie (project coordinators) took early retirement to go to Lubumbashi and oversee the project full time. As soon as they arrived Donald began cultivating the 40 acre farm. After four months they have already harvested a variety of produce. Some of the produce is sold to raise funds for the project and the rest used to feed the children. We are investing in 2 water tanks and piping to improve irrigation capacity to enable crops to grow successfully all year round.

Here's the lorry we exported a couple of years ago. It's regularly on its way to Lubumbashi from the Zambian border with a load of cargo. This business generates a good income.

We are so proud of Donald, Marie and the team at Hebron Homes for the amazing work they are doing. These guys are literally 'changing lives for a brighter future'.
